"BIG TEN" DINNER RATES A B-I-G "10"!!

As far as anniversary dinners go, the Society's 10th anniversary dinner was a real blockbuster! The event, held at the Golden Shark Restaurant in Monterey Park on Saturday, Oct. 19, was attended by 390 persons.

Opening the program was Glen Yee's beautiful rendition of "God Bless America". Glen is the elder son of Chuck and Mary Yee, and a talented and personable young man. Welcoming remarks by President Munson Kwok was the beginning of a full and exciting program. Master of ceremonies Frank Kwan of KNBC-TV introduced several guests -- newly-elected Los Angeles City Councilman Mike Woo, Monterey Park Councilwoman Lily Lee Chen, and noted actor James Hong. Next on the program was a slide-show, "Ten Years of History-making", showing many events and projects sponsored by CHSSC, narrated by Frank Kwan and James Hong. Then came the presentations to the Society's past presidents -- Stan Lau, Founding President, succeeded by George Yee, Gerald Shue, Chuck Yee, and Eugene Moy -- each with his own measure of leadership, dedication, and innovative ideas, all of which contributed mightily to the growth and progress of CHSSC. Of no small significance were the presidents' "first ladies", who also gave their wholehearted support to the Society -- Dora Lau, Elsie Yee, Mary Yee.

Two pioneers, prominent in their respective fields and well-loved by the community, were honored -- members Tyrus Wong and Gilbert Leong. A beautiful commentary by Ruby Ling Louie accompanied an outstanding slide-show which presented the notable accomplishments of the "AA twins" -- artist (Tyrus) and architect (Gilbert), each a genius in his own field. As Society members, both have contributed their talents in various ways -- Gilbert for the CHSSC logo and the design for recently-acquired membership pins, and Tyrus for his artwork on the 10th anniversary logo and on other projects. The Society is highly honored to have these two pioneers as active and dedicated members, so gracious with their time and exceptional talents.

As anyone knows, none of the Society's semi-annual dinners are complete without a contribution in the entertainment line from one or all of the Yee family. This night was no exception, as George Yee and his zany "Crazy Hatters" took center stage and had the audience literally in stitches! If there had been more room between tables, everyone would have been rolling in the aisles! As George read the script (as only George can do it), the skits were being acted out -- so clever and hilarious that the show had to be seen to be believed -- difficult to describe in detail, except to say that the characters' faces were not in their normal places, and although they were "dressed to the nines", it was quite impossible to see who were playing the various parts until the end when each was unmasked, or rather un-hatted, to be specific. It was then that the audience discovered that under those crazy gigantic hats lurked the smiling faces of the Yee brothers -- Chuck, Johnson, Joe and Bill.

Very clever, these Yees -- but how will they ever be able to top this?

Life Members were honored, and to represent all 60 of them, Evelyn Cucchiarella presented two special Life Membership pins to Grace Chow and to Johnny Yee (brother Chuck accepted John's pin for him). The 106 Charter members were also recognized.

All in all, it was a most outstanding evening, celebrating the Society's first ten

years of achievement. A switch was pulled, and the new lights in the square came on.

He is currently president of the Chinatown Merchants Association.
