HAWAII

Thirty members and friends experienced an outstanding field trip to Honolulu and Dahu, Aug. 1-10. Highlights included an in-depth tour of Honolulu's Chinatown, led by those energetic "young" men in their 70's, Larry Ing and Yankee Chang. We were shown the Hawaii Chinese History Center by 79 year old H.D. Cheng, who walked the entire 2 1/2 hour Chinatown tour with us.

Another major event was the Hawaiian-Chinese style banquet with the Center. Featured speaker, on the history of the Chinese in Hawaii, was Ken Yee. The Society honored the Center for its pioneering work and leadership in Chinese American history with the "patented" Society scroll resolution created by our George Yee and Glenn Yee. Pioneers recognized with Society certificates of appreciation were Ken Yee; Irma Tam Soong, one of our earliest dinner speakers and Center Executive Director Emeritus; Punanani Kini, Executive Director; Douglas Chong, President; and Roger Lui, Treasurer. Certificates were also given to authors-researchers Tin Yuke Char and Wai Jane Char ("Sandlewood Mountain" and others) and Kum Pui Lai and Violet Lai ("He Was a Ram"). The Lai's will be our featured speakers in November. The hospitality offered by everyone was wonderful, and several have sent us gracious thank you acknowledgments for their awards.

A most memorable fun event was the swim and snorkel expedition to Hanauma Bay.

This tour was the most ambitious and complex the Society has ever developed. Great thanks are due to Chair Albert Lum and Florence Lum, who served as our tour leaders on Oahu. They filled our days with activities and information. They also put in several months of efforts and resources in preparation. Thanks are also due to drivers Alan Bergman, Dawes Lee, and Elmo Gambarana, and to them and to Marvey Chapman and Suellen Cheng for working various tour details. A very special thank-you is due to Nancy Yee, wife of Ken Yee, for all the work she did in planning and preparing.

THE PARTY'S OVER (AND A GOOD TIME WAS HAD BY ALL!)

For the September 4th meeting, CHSSC and the Friends of the Chinatown Library cosponsored a book party for member Ruthanne Lum McCunn to herald her latest book, "Sole Survivor", to be officially on the stands in October. The book recounts the harrowing ordeal experienced by a Chinese merchant seaman, Lim Poon, while he was adrift alone on a raft in the Atlantic Ocean when his ship was torpedoed during World War II.

Following a few introductory remarks by Margie Lew (alias Ye Editor of News 'n Notes), the capacity crowd (well over 100) enjoyed a very fascinating talk by Ruthanne, telling of her interviews with Mr. Poon, and her various methods of research into his boyhood years in China (Hainan), as well as the logs and records of the merchant ship on which Mr. Poon was sailing at the time of the attack. The result is a gripping account of this courageous man's 133-day ordeal at sea and how he was able to survive, both mentally and physically. In the Sept. 11 issue of East/West, a San Francisco weekly publication, "Sole Survivor" merited a full page review, written by Judy Yung. Anyone who reads the book will certainly agree with author Dorothy Bryant, who stated that "McCunn's evocative prose makes us feel, taste, smell every moment of his 133-day ordeal. She gives us a hero of subtle intelligence, resourcefulness, patience, and endurance".

An autographing session followed Ruthanne's talk -- and the line was \underline{long} , with everyone eager to meet and greet the author.

A letter received from Ruthanne the following week stated that "...we have rarely experienced such a warm welcome. We did not feel that we were among strangers, but friends. My thanks to the Society for the delicious dinner and the warm response. My apologies to all the people who had to stand in line for so long -- I will have to learn how to write faster!"

The Society and the Friends would like to thank you, Ruthanne, and your husband Don for coming down to Los Angeles and making this occasion an extra special one for us. Congratulations and best wishes on the publication of "Sole Survivor", and please convey the Society's warmest regards to Mr. Poon when you see him in New York next month at your book preview.
