The Crossover represents crossing over the bodies of water from China to Hong Kong to Cuba, crossing over the vicisitud and obstacles of life to seek a better life and also crossing over of genes from Chinese to Black.

Cy Wong is a person of many talents — actor, singer, and songwriter. As a professional singer, he started under the late Nate King Cole Record Company. While under contract to the late Nat King Cole's Label K-C Records, he wrote numerous hits. He is an actor who has ventured into TV commercials and has appeared in a number of daytime TV shows and Movie of the Week. Society member, Diana Wong, is showing her most recent works, including 12 monoprints on handmade paper, entitled "Vista Santa Monica," and 20 canvases from her latest series, "Beyond." The latter series of acrylic enamel on canvas is a carryover of the big, splashy, and colorful bravura of her "Peng" series, which was received enthusiastically at the New York Institute of Technology in 1987 and included in her retrospective at the Taipei Fine Arts Museum. In 1988, the paintings made a much talked about exhibit in Hong Kong at the Alisan Fine Arts Gallery.

The canvases of the "Beyond" series glow with light and energy. Scattered and dripped across the canvas, the acrylic colors flow into forms suggesting cosmic shapes and events. Winds, clouds, and fire erupt and merge into scenes that aim to stimulate the viewer's "cosmic eye," his own sense of places, parts, and movements on the grand stage of the universe.

Her "Vista Santa Monica" monoprints originated with the brief reflection in her rear view mirror of Colorado Avenue down to the Santa Monica pier. The monoprints are abstract variations on that view, reflecting the changes in light, color, and mood that occur every day as the time changes. Her monoprints show calligraphic rhythms reminiscent of her early classical brush training, developed into a bold individual style.
