CAL PAW FINAL FIGURES - It was a memorable hot summer this year for the members and friends who volunteered to help Suellen Cheng go out to public places to gather those necessary signatures on those green initiative petitions. Remember? They induced registered voters to sign to put the Cal Paw '94 measure on next June's California ballot, which has earmarked \$500,000 for the Chinese American Museum Suellen's group is working to build at historic El Pueblo Historic Park in Los Angeles.

Well, officially 720,900 signatures were collected in California, 90,677 in Southern California. We had promised 5,000 signatures, upped it to 6,000, then ended up with 7,000 -- way over the top! Once Secretary of State March Fong Eu certifies the results, it will move on to next year's ballot. Wee!

Suellen Cheng and assistant Elmo Gambarana wish they could personally thank each of the almost 60 petition volunteers in our group for their ready response when asked, and great spirit in facing a sometimes indifferent or hostile public. Stand and Be Proud!

UPDATE ON CHINATOWN HERITAGE AND VISITORS CENTER - As outlined in last month's newsletter, an ad hoc Building Committee has been researching the feasibility of this project. The Chinatown Heritage and Visitors Center could be a very exciting project in

which the CHSSC would establish: a permanent presence in the community within a historic structure, an outreach point for the many visitors to Chinatown, and a heritage resource center to facilitate our ongoing work in the research, collection, and interpretation of community and Chinese American history.

The CHSSC Board of Directors has met twice in the past two weeks to discuss further the possibility of taking on this \$1.8 million (estimated) project. The Board has now formally designated a special Building Committee to prepare a detailed scope of development and financial plan. Members of the Committee will be consulting with other non-profit community groups and with legal/financial advisors in the coming weeks to put together a financial plan. At upcoming monthly meetings, progress updates will be provided, and finally, the overall plan will be presented to the general membership for a decision on whether to proceed.

As noted last month, the planning effort will require assistance from a few good people in the following areas: public relations, fundraising, historic preservation (landmark designation), and planning/design/construction. SOCIETY DISPLAYS OLD CHINATOWN ARCHAEOLOGICAL TREASURES AT L.A. CONSERVANCY CELEBRATION AT UNION STATION - At the Los Angeles Conservancy's 15th anniversary celebration on October 17, 1993, Sue Yee, Randy Bloch and Jim Fong presented samples of the Old Chinatown archaeological treasures recovered near Union Station during Red Line construction a few years ago. The Museum of Chinese-American History also contributed displays including an overlay map depicting Old Chinatown, which stood upon the site of the train station.

The Conservancy's anniversary was a gala event, featuring a silent auction led by television personality Huell Howser, giant anniversary cakes in the shape of historic landmarks like Angel's Flight and the Bradbury Building, and various international cuisines, served outside.

The Conservancy enjoys a well-deserved reputation as the premier preservation organization in Los Angeles. We appreciate their extending us the opportunity to illuminate a side of the Union Station story that is too often lost in the dust of history.

REQUEST FOR HELP - (Received letter from Pat Saletore, 22610 Lilac Court, Saugus, CA 91350.) I would very much appreciate help on this project. I am at a loss to continue investigating it. Chinese History in the Santa Clarita Valley isn't just scarce, it isn't there. I can be reached at (805) 296-2517.

"The Mystery of the Chinese Miner" - This article is really sort of query. Actually, it is more of a plea for help. In the Santa Clarita Valley, we have been engaged in a war against a dump that is proposed in one of our nearby canyons. My contribution to the fight has included hiking around in the canyon, which is located in the Angeles National Forest. I have located an anomalous area which I refer to as the "Chinese Miner's Digs".

Deep in Elsmere Canyon, on a stretch of the creek which always has a little water, there is a doorway. It rests on a level with the creek near its threshold and is about five feet high and three feet wide. Brush camouflages its entry and you can walk by it without even seeing it. But it presents a mystery. Downstream from this door I found another anomalous item ... a black abalone shell. Elsmere is filled with marine fossils, but this was no fossil and the canyon is far from the ocean. Above this are some strange waterfalls, which look like rock walls. In this inaccessible reach of Elsmere Canyon, someone has constructed a series or rock walls across the stream. Aside from now being beautiful waterfalls, why? I took an archeologist to see them. He postulated that a Chinese miner has been mining for oil or gold there. At that, the archaeologist (who is paid by the dump developer) dropped the subject. There are two other human made holes on the canyon wall above the "mine". But the really strange part of this scenario is that the mine has been purposely backfilled -- why? With information so scarce on Chinese history in Southern California should we shrug and turn away from this anomaly? Were the rock walls really dams to facilitate mining? Was the mysterious abalone shell washed from the Chinese Miner's refuse heap? What is buried in his "mine"?

I would like information on the Chinese community in Southern California in the late 1870's. I would like leads on a place in Santa Clarita called "China Gulch" which reportedly has been seen on old maps of the area. Even more important, I would like a well informed (and physically strong) Chinese historian to come and see what I may be missing. If this site proves to be significant, it will contribute to the pools of knowledge about a little known subject and it may stop the process of siting a 190 million ton landfill within a couple of miles of Santa Clarita Historical Society's Heritage Junction! Please help us!
