"THE EIGHT IMMORTALS; CHINESE AMERICAN PLACENAMES"

Speaker: Dr. Tom McDannold

The recent discoveries by Tom McDannold, past President of the Chinese Historical Society of Southern California, since an earlier presentation.

In the last two years, more placenames have been researched and this discussion focuses on eight individuals and how they came to be immortalized in placenames. This slide-illustrated lecture is recent findings of his research.

The term Chinese placename represents a formalized record of Chinese presence on the land. Tom has travelled throughout California identifying Chinese placenames. In addition, Tom will explain that Chinese placenames usually reflect non-Chinese perception of the Chinese.

As cultural conditions have changed, so do the giving of Chinese placenames. Placenames are no longer concerned with associating locations or geographic areas with the Chinese. Instead, they reflect individuals and their contributions to society. placenames are notable because they represent an official memorialization of the Chinese contribution by entities such as federal, state, and local governments.

Dr. Tom McDannold is past President of CHSSC. He is Chair of the Earth Science Department at Ventura College. He teaches geography, geology, meteorology, and ... His talk this evening will be a continuation of the further research since the 1992 Conference of Chinese Americans.


