February 17 - 19, 1995 - Southern symposium - Santa Clarita. Three days of exciting workshops and tours. Hear about the discovery of gold under The Oak of Golden Dreams, six years before the one in Northern California.

"SERVICE WITH HONOR" and 50 YEARS LATER. "Assemble for Roll Call." With those words, MC Marji Lee started the parade to the podium of over 70-strong World War II Chinese American veterans, men and women, at the Society's recent Fall Banquet and Awards held at The Empress Pavilion Restaurant on Veterans Day Eve, Nov. 10. Led by our "swabbies" (U.S. Navy) Johnny Yee and Al Lew in full uniform with their real campaign medals, the vets provided a stirring update on themselves in announcing their name, rank, branch of service, unit and theater. As Society member Dolores Wong later noted, their appearance provided a wonderful and emotional comparison of now and then, "then" having been recaptured, to the background tunes of Glenn Miller, in the immediately preceding masterful slide show of our special guests in their days of glory, narrated by Ms. Lee and Suellen Cheng. Witnessed by 350, each WW II veteran received a keepsake with the Society's logo and the inscription "Service With Honor," expressing the appreciation of the community, even 50 years later, for their service and sacrifice. Also appearing in uniform (U.S. Army) were Bob Jung and George W. Tom.

Prior to this climatic moment, the Society presented its Pioneer Recognition Award to American Legion American Chinese Post No. 628, a uniquely Chinese American institution with a membership of dedicated veterans which has also provided community service to Los Angeles Chinatown for nearly 50 years. Accepting from Pres. Irvin R. Lai and Awards Chair Munson Kwok was Commander Norman Leong, a veteran of Vietnam. Setting the tone for the evening was high Legion official Bill Anderson of the Dept. of Water and Power post, who reminisced about the contributions of the Chinese in World War II. The evening was further focused by the historical remarks of Dr. James Bok Wong, of the 407th Field Service Squadron of the famed 14th Air Force. Of the 20,000 or so Chinese American veterans of WW II, some 25% saw service in the Army Air Force, and perhaps upwards to 4,000 in the China Burma India theater of the 14th Air Force and other units, many in segregated units. One featurette of the evening was door prizes for the WWII vets alone: a WWII book, a WWII stamp collection, and a money tree, by Margie and Al Lew. This military-styled evening began with the presentation of colors by the all-female Wilson High School R.O.T.C. Color Guard headed by Cadet Capt. Elsa Tinoco.

The spirit of dedication for the evening, "to the fallen and departed," was established in the Invocation by Cy Wong, and further amplified in remarks by Society President Lai. At the conclusion, the now assembled WW II veterans, lead by Judge Delbert Wong and Al Lew, stood at attention and saluted their departed comrades.

Surrounded by red, white, and blue bunting, with American flag decorations everywhere, the gala aspect was started by a wonderful reunion and reception and carried through with a galaxy of door prizes and the Society's first ever Silent Auction, with over 17 gifts to consider. Hottest items to be bid were a one-of-a-kind "Dinner with the Dinner Committee" for 10, with catering to be done by master chefs Irvin Lai (traditional Cantonese), Cy Wong (Louisiana BBQ), and Marji Lee (noveau cuisine) and a host of others of the 1994 Fall Banquet Committee. The next hottest item was CHSSC's premiere tour for 10 with dim sum lunch at the Empress. Some money was certainly raised for the Society's projects and to attempt to balance the yearly budget. For long time members, this event was the largest and most complex dinner in almost a decade. The working crew of nearly 40 can be content that nothing but happy faces could be seen (on video) leaving the Empress at the conclusion of a memorable evening. (filed by M. Kwok)
