SOCIETY BREAKS GROUND FOR SHRINE RESTORATION - Groundbreaking ceremonies were held Thursday morning, January 12th, at the Evergreen Cemetery in Boyle Heights. The event was well attended by members of the Shrine Committee, CHSSC Board members, other CHSSC members, Chinatown leaders, City Councilman Richard Alatorre, and representatives of other elected officials.

This joyous event, the culmination of almost 5 years of effort, was marked by poetry recital in English and Chinese, presentation of flowers, and meaningful speeches.

The Department of Cultural Affairs' General Manager, Adolfo Nodal, remarked in his statement "most of us are so busy maintaining mainstream history that the rest gets lost. This is a wonderful attempt to change that. We are going to be with you all the way on this."

The groundbreaking ceremony was reported in several Chinese language daily newspapers, the Los Angeles Times, the City Times, and the Japanese-American daily, Rafu Shimpo. Additionally, several elected officials sent certificates of recognition to the Society for its work to restore the shrine.

CHINATOWN HERITAGE & VISITORS CENTER: OUR NEW HOME!

By the time you read this newsletter, escrow will have closed on the CHSSC's purchase of the historic property at 411-415 Bernard Street. The Society has now successfully completed the first step toward establishing a permanent office and developing a center to preserve our community's rich heritage. The Building Committee wishes to thank the many donors who gave generously to make this first step possible. (SEE ATTACHED LIST OF DONORS). All donors of \$500 or more (founding donors or higher category) will be permanently recognized in a prominent location in the new Los Angeles Chinatown Heritage & Visitors Center.

MORE FUNDRAISING. We have achieved our first goal for the Center, and must now move forward to the next goals. We must set aside sufficient funds to meet our note payments for at least 2-3 years. We need to begin formal architectural and engineering design. Some preliminary work, such as foundation reinforcement, should be done right away. To build up the CHSSC Building Fund, established by the CHSSC Board solely for this project, the Fundraising Co-Chairs, Ken Chan and Nadine Soo Hoo Levy wll be working with the project's Advisory Board to bring in major contributions. The Grants subcommittee has begun the grant application process with several prospective foundations, and the Building Committee has been laying the groundwork for assistance from government agencies. However, big donations, grants and government loans all require substantial matching contributions from private community sources. Therefore we ask for continuing help from all CHSSC members, either through personal contributions or by referrals to individuals, businesses, or organizations who may be able to help. CHSSC members are invited to be proud ambassadors for our project, which we know will increase the public awareness of our Los Angeles and Chinatown heritage. Please share your ideas with us. CALL FOR L.A. MARATHON VOLUNTEERS, SUNDAY, MARCH 5. One of the great spectacles in Chinatown every year is the sight of 20,000+ persons running, walking, skating, or wheelchairing on their way to personal glory, the 26.2 mile run known as the Los Angeles Marathon. This year, for the sixth straight year, the emerging Chinatown Cultural & Community Center of Greater Los Angeles, Inc. will be a co-sponsoring charity for Mile 6, the Chinatown Mile. The CCCC-GLA has been using this opportunity to increase awareness of its ongoing planning efforts. For the Marathon, CCCC-GLA has been organizing the 100-200 volunteers needed to provide course security and runners' aid within Mile 6. VOLUNTEERS ARE NEEDED.
