FROM CHINATOWN to INDOCHINATOWN:

A Comparative Perspective of Northern & Southern California

Joe Chung Fong will discuss social changes, immigration and identity among recent immigrants in the Los Angeles area. Mr. Fong will share the results of his Lincoln Heights study. His discussion will focus on his insights about Lincoln Heights; the problems, the support of the community and the changes. Also, Mr. Fong will compare the migration of the recent Chinese immigrants in Southern California to that of Northern California.

Joe Chung Fong has a B.A. from U.C. Davis on Political Science. He has an M.A. in American Studies from U.C.L.A. and an M.A. in Anthropology from U.C. Berkeley. Currently, Mr. Fong is a U.C. Berkeley Ph.D. candidate tracking Asian Immigrants at Lincoln High School.

<u>WELCOME BACK</u> - We welcome back Walt Wheelcock to the member ranks after so many years. Walt, 87 now, was among the earliest members of the Chinese Historical Society and loved our dinners then. He is still studying the earliest presses and printing shops in California.

MOTHER CABRINI REMEMBERED - Member Munson Kwok has had recent occasion to assist Prof. Gloria Lothrop, one of our past speakers, in salvaging a piece of American history in Chinatown. On the Chinatown site of the Cabrini School for Girls, corner of Cesar Chavez Blvd. and Hill Place, are the remnants of a grotto to the Virgin. Although historic, just as is our Cemetery Shrine, it has been ruled by experts as not adequately significant for site preservation. A prompt alert by Kwok has facilitated the movement of the shrine to a church and facility honoring Mother Cabrini, located on Imperial Blvd. The removal and restoration will be funded by artisans of the Italian American community. The Chinatown site itself will become a Community Redevelopment project for much needed affordable income housing. An appropriate historical memorial to Mother Cabrini will be installed on the project site by CRA and the developer. Why is this important to us? CHSSC is the preserver of the area's history. Mother Cabrini herself founded this school. Because of a life of good works, Mother Cabrini became the first American Roman Catholic Saint. She is therefore one of the prominent personages who lived and worked in what is today's Chinatown prior to the turn of the century.

JUDITH OWYANG, former member of CHSSC, sent Holiday Greetings to all our members. She also included the following article printed autumn 1996 in the USC Trojan Family Magazine, Alumni News section. Judith "is a museum scientific expert who is currently under contract by the German government to inventory and appraise World War II losses from Berlin museums. Among the treasures she is surveying is, appropriately enough, a stash of Trojan Gold.

"It's one of the most famous collections in archaeological history," she explains. Heinrich Schliemann, a German business tycoon and self-taught archaeologist, unearthed the treasure of gold goblets, plates and jewelry from the ancient ruins of Troy in Turkey in 1873. He purchased the treasures from Turkey and bequeathed them to Germany in 1880.

"In retaliation for the massive destruction wrought on the U.S.S.R. by the Nazis, Soviet forces in Germany at the end of World War II captured much of Schliemann's Trojan gold collection in a Berlin museum. The collection disappeared, but few knew to where. Recently, Russian officials finally fessed up: more than 1,500 golden objects excavated from Homer's legendary city had been trucked to Moscow and placed in secret storage.

"Now that the treasures have been found, the German nation would like them returned," says Owyang, who is assistant to Berlin curator and international art sleuth Klaus Goldmann. "When that happens it will be the happiest day of Professor Goldmann's life."

"The Trojan Gold collection is a big piece in the trophy-hunting puzzle left from the war, but 'the Red Army snatched an estimated two milion other objects from German castles, museums and storage bunkers, 'says Owyang. Her take on who should get what is straightforward: "When any soldier or politician ripped something off, it should be returned," she says. "Stealing is stealing."
