Judy Yung is a second-generation Chinese American born and raised in San Francisco Chinatown. She worked as a librarian and journalist before receiving her Ph.D. in Ethnic Studies from U.C. Berkeley in 1990. Since then she has been teaching Asian American Studies at U.C. Santa Cruz. Yung is the co-author of Island: Poetry and History of Chinese Immigrants at Angel Island. 1910-1940 and author of Chinese Women of America: A Pictorial Exhibit. She has been an active member of the Chinese Historical Society of America since 1981 and a member of the Editorial Committee of Chinese America: History and Pespectives since 1987.

CHINESE GOLD AT THE AUTRY MUSEUM OF WESTERN HERITAGE - Director and independent film-maker Nancy Kelly has donated items from her 1991 movie, Thousand Pieces of Gold, to the Autry Museum of Western Heritage in Los Angeles. With a classic Western theme, the work is also the first popular American film to feature an Asian woman as the leading character. Lalu, a Chinese woman sold into slavery, survives, like many other Western characters, because of (and in spite of) her fierce independence. Delivered to an Idaho mining town in the 1880s, she is supposed to become a wife, barmaid, and prostitute. Lalu refuses, and thus begins her struggle to adapt to her strange, often violent and racist, new home. INFO WANTED ON DR. MARGARET CHUNG - Stanford Ph.D. student Judy Wu seeks assistance for her dissertation research on Dr. Margaret Jessie Chung (1889 - 1959), reputedly the first Chinese American female doctor. Dr. Chung grew up in Southern California, working her way through medical school while also taking care of her ten younger siblings. She established one of the first Western medical clinics in San Francisco Chinatown in the early 1920s and helped found the Chinese Hospital. Interested at a young age in becoming a medical raissionary in China, she eventually participated in patriotic activities to support the U.S. and China during World War II. She helped recruit aviators for the Flying Tigers, fundraised for the war effort, and served on the medical staff of the Disaster Relief Commission of the American National Red Cross. She also initiated the Waves Bill which advocated the formation of a female auxiliary for tha U.S. Navy. Dr. Chung achieved some fame for becoming the adopted "morn" to a number of American aviators and navy personnel, who called themselves "Mom Ohung's Fair-Haired Bastards." The group eventually grew to more than a thousand and included such famous individuals as General Claire L. Chennault, Ronald Reagan, and singer Sophie Tucker.
