1996 SPRING DINNER chaired by Jeffrey Tung and his committee members was a huge success. 200 guests filled the room at the Empress Pavilion Restaurant on Friday, May 17, for a very impressive program. Randall Bloch, co-chair of the Shrine Committee presented a review of the progress of the Shrine to the completion of Phase I at the Evergreen Cemetery. Everyone was invited to see it first hand the next afternoon (Saturday, May 18 at 2 p.m.) Phase II will begin soon with the help of some grant money from the Los Angeles Cultural Affairs Dept. and the generous donations of members and friends. Loni Ding, an independent filmmaker, presented the first show of a planned 4-part public television series called "Ancestors in America." Asians in the Americas: Coolies, Sailors, Settlers will be the lead-off program focusing on the Chinese migration to the Americas telling its story from points along the way as diverse as Guangdong village, a fishing community in India, and Filipino sailors in the bayous of Louisiana as early as the

Japanese Americans from 100th/442nd Veterans Association and the Military Intelligence Service of Southern California filled two tables to honor Loni Ding whose films Nisei Soldier and The Color of Honor helped make history when they were shown to the United States Congress prior to the passage of the Japanese American redress bill.

LOS ANGELES HISTORIC-CULTURAL MONUMENT #486 is the official name of the Chinese Shrine that CHSSC has preserved at the Evergreen Cemetery in Boyle Heights (1st and Evergreen Streets). GREAT WALLS PROGRAM. An anti-graffiti program for Chinatown is being undertaken by the Community Redevelopment Agency of the City of Los Angeles (CRA) in cooperation with the Chinatown Community. The CRA and Community will work with property owners in advance to gain access to endangered walls on their property. The artists will be under contract to the CRA. There will also be a three-party-letter agreement signed by the artist, the CRA, and the property owner.


