NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN ASIAN AMERICAN STUDIES by Professor Kenyon S. Chan

Professor Kenyon S. Chan is the founding Chair of the Asian American Studies Department at the California State University, Northridge. He is an educational psychologist by training and taught at the Graduate School of Education at UCLA for many years. He was also the Coordinator for Education and Policy Studies at the National Center for Bilingual

Research.

In his research, Dr. Chan focuses on the effects of racism on the emotional development of children and on socio-cultural factors that affect schooling for bilingual and Asian American children. He has published research on Asian American, Hawaiian, African American, Chicano/a, and Native American children.

His presentation will focus on new developments in Asian American Studies and how universities and organizations like the Chinese Historical Society can build

stronger links and cooperative activities.
