Where is Home? That rhetorical question was the inspiration for much examination and dialog at the $6^{\text {th }}$, although billed as the $5^{\text {th }}$ as CHSSC held the $4^{\text {th }}$ and the $5^{\text {th }}$ was in Honolulu, the $6^{\text {th }}$ Chinese American Studies Conference held during the spectacular Indian summer weekend of October $10-12$ in New York City at New York University. This first-ever gathering of the type east of the Sierras generated a record attendance of over 300 , signaling that Chinese Americans on the east coast had come of age as a revitalized social force and that the cadre of scrious scholars and community organizations there is growing. In addition to examining the traditional subjects of history, "Where is Home?" took on much of the trappings of a cultural festival reflecting the eclectic good taste of Prof. Jack Tchen, the principal organizer.

Thus the opening night included poetry and prose and the intellectual call for conference participants to examine the new issues. Some of this flavor was expressed in one sequence, in which the diversity of the Chinese American world (at least as seen from New York) was soundly emphasized by a sequence of speakers speaking Chinese American community issues, or their common denominator, who were not Chinese American. These included James Early, African American representing the Smithsonian Institution, Dr. Tom Bender, intellectual historian and dean at NYU, the Hon. Nydia Velazquez, Member of Congress and a professor, every bit the equal of our Lucille Roybal-Allard in voicing the cause for immigrants, and Elizabeth Yeampierre, an organizer from Sunset Park, Brooklyn. Sunset Park was shown to be a unique neighborhood in which Latino and Chinese have coexisted in exemplary harmony.

The theme of diversity was continued at Saturday's luncheon when a panel of Chinese Americans described what it was like to be New Yorkers, although they weren't quite. Tony Chan, filmaker, once was a Hong Kong immigrant, Fay Chiang is their renowned regional poet, Fabiana Chiu is once a Peruvian who is a museum expert, "Charlie" Chin, raconteur, now lives in San Mateo, and Cindy Hsu, a military brat just blowing into town as new CBS anchor. The point was brought home that virtually everyone is an immigrant or first generation native-born. Another difference in demographics is a preponderance of Spanish speaking Chinese, from the Caribbean and South America.

On the cultural side, highlights included introduction of Loni Ding's new completed opus, Ancestors in America Part II: Chinese in the Frontier West: An American Story. Students presented dramatic readings of Ruth Ann Lum McCuum's Wooden Fish Songs. New was the multimedia panel showing works in progress and the ideas for exciting new national Web sites.

True to the New York City tradition for activism, the Conference passed a resolution protesting NYPD police brutality against an old man in his own apartment in Chinatown. He was a retired medical scholar and college professor. This August outrage had gone unanswered.

Sunday, enjoying the sun and the dense, colorful promenade of New Yorkers that the unseasonable warmth brought out in Greenwich Village and in Chinatown, our CHSSC contingent took the informative Museum of Americas walking tour and discovered their World War II monument on the outskirts of Chinatown. Our delegation of Paul and Emma Louie, Jeff Tung, Marji Lee, Charles Wong, Jim Fong, Elmo Gambarana, Calvin and Winnie Lee, and Munson and Suellen Kwok, and Jeff Ow had the most memorable time that included one last NY Chinatown feast orchestrated by the rediscovered Dr. June Yuet Mei, lead staffer of the Southern Califomia Chinese American Oral History project nearly 20 years ago.
