PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I am excited, but daunted, at becoming President of the Chinese Historical Society of Southern California (CHSSC). It will be very challenging to continue and expand the many projects of the Society. A collective effort of our membership will be required to accomplish our goals.

I want to introduce myself to those who do not know me. I attended the University of Tennessee in my hometown, Knoxville. After graduation, I taught 2nd grade for three years in a rural Tennessee town. When I first came to Los Angeles 22 years ago, I did office work for several different companies. In January 1981, I began teaching at Castelar Elementary School. I have no children of my own, but I have had the privilege of being able to know and teach so many wonderful children. Currently, I am a board member and past President of the Friends of the Chinatown Library. Since coming to Los Angeles, I have learned a lot about the Chinese culture and the history of the Chinese in America—enough to know that there is much more to learn.

As part of my new responsibilities as President of the CHSSC, I am committed to furthering the Society's goals of promoting awareness and understanding of the Chinese American heritage and documenting the history of the early Chinese pioneers. My vision for the future begins with making the Bernard Street houses our "home" and paying for them. We need to develop programs for the Heritage and Visitors Center and have it remain open more often. Now that our office is at 415 Bernard Street, we need to make the building more suitable for our needs. For one thing, in order to house the entire archival collection at the office, we need air conditioning to maintain a more uniform temperature.

My vision for CHSSC also includes the completion of two of our current projects before the end of the year. The WWII book is ready to be sent to the printer. Franklin Mah and his team of volunteers are working every Saturday at 411 Bernard Street to digitalize the archival materials. As we have over 2,000 items in our archives, the grant from the Haynes Foundation is only a beginning step.

CHSSC has always conducted tours of Chinatown, but we need more docents. Ellen Wu has been hired to prepare an updated manual for docents. A last goal I have is to increase membership. Therefore, this Fall we will be initiating a membership drive for 1999 with prizes as incentives.

I am an educator and have no experience in fund-raising. However, funds are needed for us just to maintain the projects we have now. Our first fund-raising event is our October 2nd dinner at the Empress Pavilion. Since Chinatown will not be having an official Moon Festival celebration this year, CHSSC will celebrate the Moon Festival with Chinese music, moon-viewing and mooncakes. Please show your support for the Society by attending our Fall Dinner. I hope to see you there.

SOCIETY GREETS THE LOTUS FESTIVAL by Elmo Gambarana

It was one of those hot July weekend mornings as a trio of CHSSC board members hurriedly assembled a colorful booth at the Lotus Festival in Echo Lake Park. Facing the exotic lotus flowers, newly bloomed in the lake, on July 11 & 12, several dedicated board members greeted curious passerbys with information on the many varied programs and past record of our decades-old Society. MULAN' TO THE RESCUE by Elmo Gambarana

A patient group of CHSSC members, their young children, and friends, waited patiently in line outside the Alex Theatre in Glendale, Sunday afternoon, June 5, waiting to be released to go see the new Disney film "Mulan" at 5 p.m. Led by Ways & Means Chair and board member Elmo who was bravely holding a tall new banner, the almost 30 persons were rewarded with an opening stage show followed by the animated film dramatizing the legendary heroic Chinese heroine, Mulan, vanquishing Tarter invaders. BARTON CHOY TO DESIGN MCAH - On May 4, 1998, the Friends of the Museum of Chinese American History (MCAH) signed a contract with architect Barton Choy of Choy Associates. The Museum will be located in the north bay of the Garnier Building, at the corner of Los Angeles Street and Arcadia Avenue, in the El Pueblo de Los Angeles Historical Monument. MCAH President Ronald Lew is hopeful that it will be completed in the year 2000.
