## Speaker: <br> PROFESSOR MIN ZHOU

Min Zhou, Ph. D., is Associate Professor of Sociology and Asian American Studies at UCLA. Her main areas of research are immigration, immigration adaptation, ethnic economics and race ethnicity. Her talk will focus on her study of New York Chinatown and its implication on the working class. She will explain how immigrant women shoulder double responsibilities of work and home and how it affects their perception of self and family.

Professor Zhou is author of Chinatown: The Socioeconomic Potential of an Urban Enclave and co-author of Growing Up American: The Adaptation of Vietnamese children to American Society.

EAST MEETS WEST<br>(on a railroad track)<br>by Maraie Lew

On May 10, 1869, an historic event of great significance occurred - the completion of this country's first transcontinental railroad, thereby paving the way for a westward expransion of vast proportions. On this day 129 years ago at Promontory Summit, Utah, the Central Pacific's locomotive JUPITER and the Union Pacific's 119 were joined together with a Golden Spike being driven in place.

On May 10 each year for the past 46 years, the Golden Spike National Historic Site and the Golden Spike Association from Brigham City have presented the annual Golden Spike Ceremony. This year's program included a number of dignitaries - U.S. Senator Orrin Hatch, U.S. Congressman James V. Hansen, Mr. Jyh-Yuan Lo and Mr. Hubert Chang from the Republic of China, each of whom addressed the audience. The Golden Spike Association then presented a re-enactment of the events of May 10, 1869, with local citizens dressed in costumes of that period playing the roles of the various participants in that historic event. The two locomotives JUPTER and 119 were joined together. As the Golden Spike was driven in place, the telegrapher sent the message "D-O-N-E", just as it happened 129 years ago.

However, one thing was not the same as it was then - the WEATHER! On May 10, 129 years ago, it was a typically warm Spring day. There were blue skies with hardly a cloud. But on this May 10, Mother Nature showed her temperamental side - there was rain, wind, thunder, ilghtning, and hailstones the size of marbles. Consequently, the program was delayed, and the Golden Spike was driven in about 45 minutes later than the exact historic moment of 12:47 p.m. The forecast of bad weather most certainly was the reason for the small number of attendees. Normally, for this special event, there are 5,000-7,000 people, according to the Park Rangers. Despite the rain, the crowd was enthusiastic, and most stayed to the end of the program.
NOW comes the best part
To help celebrate this memorable day, 22 CHSSC members travelled to Promontory Summit to participate in the festivities, and to honor the thousands of Chinese laborers who helped to build this railroad. John Yee and Bill Chew were the coordinators of the trip, and spent many hours taking care of details large and small. Bill did an extensive research to try to locate descendants of the Chinese workers. He found several people, who were unable to attend. But as luck would have it, the Society has its own descendants -- the Yee brothers, John, Johnson, and Bill, whose great-grandfather worked on the transcontinental.

As representatives of CHSSC, Bill Chew and John Yee were part of the program. Bill spoke of his visit to the Goiden Spike National Historic Site last year, his efforts in locating descendants of ralload workers, and his great desire to have a group of Chinese be a part of the ceremonies. As John was about to address the audience, the rain came--BIG TIMEI The program was delayed, but resumed 45 minutes later as John stated that the Society felt quite honored to participate in this celebrated event. He also noted that this was a complete turn-around from May 10, 1869 when the contributions of thousands of Chinese laborers were ignored and unrecognized at that time and for many years atter. John then presented to Superintendent Bruce Powell a booklet to be included in the Golden Spike archives, The booklet willinclude, among other information, the names and photos of the railroad workers and their descendants. CHSSC also presented a plague inscribed with the following words:

[^0]Next followed the re-enactment of the two locomotives coming together. When the "last spike" was hammered in, the Society's special "surprise" was shown -- a traditional Lion Dance, complete with cymbals and gongs, was presented by Jeff Chan and his assistants, Kingman and Gilbert Hom. A long string of firecrackers was lit, adding a festive touch to the grand finale and great enjoyment for the speclators.

Unaminously, Society members expressed their pleasure and enjoyment of this trip to Promontory Summit. It gave them a sense of history, and helped them to more fully appreciate the perseverance and endurance of the Chinese railroad workers who, by their years of diligent labor, unwittingly became a significant chapter in the history of America.

## Job Description.

Candidate shall support the day-to-day operations of the projects and programs of the Chinese Historical Society of Southem California under the supervision of the president or his/her designee. Candidate shall coordinate and conduct walking tours, and will assist in their development and marketing. The candidate may also give support to the preparation and marketing of the Society's publication and other Chinese American educational tools and materials. The candidate may also give support to maintenance and development of the Society's Archives. Duties may include some aspects of office operations and management, including the supervision of interns. Coordinating volunteers will be an important, frequent task. The work week will be Tuesday through Saturday, for a total of 20-24 hours per week.

## Qualifications.

Minimum of a bachelor's degree in one or more of the following disciplines required: humanities, social sciences, business administration, marketing, public relations, or related subject. Demonstrated knowledge of Asian American studies or history also highly preferred. Good writing and very strong oral communications skills shall be required of the successful candidate. Very good interpersonal, team building, and organizing skills will be essential. Bilingual abilities involving Chinese language are desirable. Experience with computers and software for business and office applications is expected.

Employment Conditions: Range of $\$ 10-15$ per hour. No benefits except 3 paid national holidays. Parking expenses paid. Job could grow to long-term, full time.
