The cold platter, shark fin soup, shrimp with cashews, scallop with asparagus, filleted carp with ham & mushroom, crispy-skinned chicken, & Peking duck were not only delicious, but also tastefully presented.

History of the Chinese Fishing Industry in California

At our May program meeting, CHSSC members and guests heard informative presentations from not one, but two, individuals at the leading edge of Chinese American historical research.

Linda Bentz, a graduate in anthropology from UCLA who considers Roberta Greenwood her mentor, shared some of her findings, which resulted from extensive research in the Channel Islands, in the communities of Ventura, Santa Barbara, and Cambria, and from the CHSSC's own Robert Nash Collection on Chinese in the shrimp fishing industry. June 17th is Father's Day and for those especially interested in the 'fathers' who came generations before them, Prof. James Lee of Cal Tech will be presenting a lecture on how to research personal Chinese family history. Currently researching in a remote village in China, Prof. James Lee is considered one of the world's leading demographers of Chinese genealogical records. He has published numerous articles and books not only on Chinese family history but also covering other aspects of Chinese culture and humanities.

The free lecture will be held at the Arcadia LDS church on June 17th from 6:30-8:30 pm. No smoking is allowed on the premisis and Sunday dress is recommended. 

the technology, such as fishing junk and sampan design, and that there were many forms of junks, from single to multiple masts; this was richly illustrated with slides from old photographs that Ms. Bentz has collected. We also learned about the political and social climate during the time that Chinese fisherman were most active, from the late 1850's to the 1890's. Fishermen were accused of smuggling, despised for using small mesh nets, which were deemed too efficient, and were subjected to discriminatory tax policies.

John C. Muir, who is Associate Curator of Small Craft at San Francisco Maritime National Historic Park, followed with another richly illustrated presentation. In 1978, during a low tide in San Francisco Bay, two sunken Chinese fishing junks were discovered in the mud near San Rafael. Mr. Muir joined in the subsequent, very tedious archeological effort to photograph and document the design and construction details of these junks, probably dating back to the 19th century, and based on this research, completed his M.A. thesis in Cultural Resources Management with a paper entitled "One Old Junk is Everyone's Treasure: The Excavation, Analysis and Interpretation of a Chinese Shrimp Junk at China Camp State Park". The research team even traveled to China, in the Pearl River Delta, the region from which many fisherman emigrated, to try and locate possible sources of the boat technology found in the mud. One distinction of the China Camp junks is that the hulls were constructed using redwood, which were not native to China; thus these junks should be recognized as being built in California, specifically for use by our Chinese American pioneers.

At this point, sufficient detail has been compiled for the Maritime Museum to reconstruct a Chinese fishing junk. Mr. Muir closed by inviting the CHSSC and interested friends to join as volunteers in the project, scheduled for May-September, 2002. We are eagerly looking forward to planning an exciting journey to join in this effort, to reconstruct a historic Chinese American vessel!



2001 Scholarship Winner Meredith Lee

The 2001 Scholarship Award for \$1,000 was presented to Ms. Meredith Lee of UCLA at our May 2nd general meeting. It was a pleasant surprise to meet her father, Ron Lee, who happened to be in town on business, and both Meredith and her father stayed and enjoyed our meeting.

Meredith was one of five finalists interviewed on April 14th for this year's scholarship, but she was the overwhelming choice of our three judges - Susan Dickson, Ella Quan, and Dr. Eugene Cooper.

Being a fifth generation Chinese American raised in Northern California, Meredith developed an interest in her roots after taking a class "for fun" at a community college entitled "The Asian-American Experience". She has found that researching her roots has been self-gratifying, expecially with so rich a family background.

Before the burning of the mortgage, Vice President Eugene Moy covered the history of the project and Chair of the Board Susan Dickson presented fifteen plaques to those individuals and organizations whose contributions to the Building Fund Campaign allowed the society to pay off the mortgage the last week of 2000. After photos were taken of the honored guests with their plaques, the ceremony began with a wok placed on the table. Used properly, woks are meant to prevent things from becoming charred and burnt contents are ridiculed; however, this wok was special. With appropriate background rock music provided by Michael, Eugene Moy handed the deed and note to Irvin Lai, who then ignited them one after another with the flame of a candle. Excited with the reality of the burden of the mortgage being lifted from the society's shoulders, the officers and several others celebrated and the guests cheered.

The icing on the cake came when an announcement was made of Drs. Steve & Millie Liu's \$10,000 and Johnson & Rosalyn Yee's \$1,000 donations for beautification of the Bernard St. homes and grounds. This money will be used for new roofs, new exterior paint jobs, and eventually for landscaping. As the ashes and smoke of the mortgage blows away with the wind, the Chinese Historical Society looks forward to planning new projects and programs, as well as continuing current programs like the CAPP project. Thank you to all who attended the Spring Dinner and especially to those who helped the dream of owning this property become a reality.

Realizing & Enjoying Chinatown

Although an hour and a half tour through a community and history that has filled novels may not be enough to transform tourist into scholar, CHSSC walking tours continue to promote awareness of Chinese American history and culture, and participants leave the tour educated and usually ready for a big lunch.

Since March 2001, CHSSC docents have led over 200 people on tours through Chinatown. Well over 100 students from John Muir H.S., Ventura College, Loyola Marymount University, Chinese School of San Marino, and other schools have enjoyed the tours. In addition, groups such as the Los Angeles Navy Reserves and many individuals, both locals and tourists, have joined in. It seems that the \$3 per student or \$5 per adult charge is usually more than a fair donation for the knowledge and understanding participants glean from the experience.

Not only do the 'walkers' gain from tours, but docents can enjoy the feeling of helping others learn. About a week ago, I was leading a group of about ten adults through the Tin Hau Temple. Their questions and sincere interest were motivating, but when they wanted to learn how to greet the locals in Chinese - and greeted *everyone* once they learned - I was really impressed! The small stipend provided for each tour isn't much, but the reward of witnessing someone gain cultural understanding is a great benefit of being a docent.

PCC Celebrates Asian Pacific American Heritage Month

One of the central goals for any historical society should be promoting and nourishing historical and, if applicable, cultural understanding among people of all ages and communities. CHSSC is no exception. In fact, in an effort to foster such awareness, we have been able to participate in Pasadena City College's celebration of Asian Pacific American June 23 - Sept 30 Heritage Month.

Throughout the months of April and May, the CAPP project, examples of our archive collection, and numerous books and society literature have been on display at the June 29 PCC's Stratford Library. Around 50 students have expressed interest in the CAPP project and being involved with the society.

Besides displaying projects at the library, we also participated in an activity day and an exhibit social, both of which allowed us to publicize CHSSC goals. On the afternoon of April 19, the open plaza in the school was filled with booths from both student and community organizations. Wushu fighters and a traditional Chinese music group performed while students wandered from table to table. Although our table's displays and material were apparently less enticing than the bake sale booths, we still managed to share some information. The following week, on April 24, about 20 students and faculty, including Prof. Susan Ling, gathered to meet Archie Miyatake, son of a famous Japanese American photographer. Fortunately, I had a few minutes to explain the CHSSC exhibits in the library, as well as introduce the goals of the society.

Hopefully, the interaction we've had and the publicity of our goals and projects have increased PCC students' awareness of Chinese American history and heritage. Thank you PCC for inviting us to participate.

The Chinatown Files Screening, by Eugene Moy

On Sunday May 20th, the CHSSC was a co-presenter for the premiere screening of The Chinatown Files, a documentary by New York-based filmmaker Amy Chen, at the VC Filmfest, the Asian Pacific American film festival sponsored by Visual Communications, held at the Directors' Guild in Hollywood. The film artfully combines live interviews with old film footage to show how McCarthy-era hysteria and harassment impacted the lives of many Chinese Americans, including 21-year old Minnesotan Eleanor Wong Telemaque. With the assistance of Theodore Sorenson, then attorney for John F. Kennedy, Eleanor was exonerated but lost her job at UNESCO as a result. She and her husband Maurice, now both CHSSC members, attended the screening, along with a number of other CHSSC members. Afterward, Amy Chen and Eleanor moved to the stage and provided insightful responses to questions from the audience. Because of its potential interest and relevance to our members, we are working to schedule another screening of The Chinatown Files for CHSSC members in the future.
