



Dr. William Shaw

It was 1979 and as a high school senior riding the subway to and from school in New York City, it was with fear and horror that I learned of another student who was pushed off of a subway platform into an oncoming train. Quickly rolling left and lying between the rails as the train rolled over her, she was able to escape death but her right hand was severed just above the wrist. Subway motorman Justo Barreiro comforted the stricken student until paramedics arrived. I remember hearing that police were able to put the hand in a bag with ice from a nearby bar and both she and her hand were transported to a hospital in New York. After 16 hours of microsurgery, all news stations in New York were happy to report the hand was reattached. The name of the high school student was Renee Katz, a 17 year old senior who would start college in the fall at the New England Conservatory of Music. What we did not hear of that day was who the surgeon was that performed the miraculous operation.

The surgeon who would later be honored by Walter Cronkite, the NYC Fire and Police departments, as well as numerous medical organizations and universities is the subject of a section in the book, Portraits of Pride II, Chinese-American Legacies - First 160 Years in America. Dr. William Shaw started from humble beginnings, working part time during high school bagging groceries and stocking shelves at his uncle's store and successfully selling real estate during the summers. He excelled in the sciences. His perseverance through academic challenges and obsession with medicine enabled him to earn his M.D. His service to America as chief of orthopedics at an Army

base in Bangkok, Thailand helped many stricken soldiers. At NYU-Bellevue Hospital, studying ways to replant severed limbs using microsurgery, he believed that if the right tools were available, he could not only save the lives of patients with crushed or severed limbs but also have them regain a higher degree of functionality. Read about how Dr. Shaw was supported by a visionary director of surgery, allowing him the freedom to study, learn, train, and eventually master the techniques needed. A state of the art microscope, a matching set of miniature surgical tools, and again, hard work and perseverance were what Dr. Shaw used to gain expertise at sewing very thin blood vessels. Intricate and detailed work requiring much stamina, Dr. Shaw and Dr. Daniel Baker were the only plastic surgery residents to devote time to learning the new techniques and coming to the rescue of New Yorkers involved in limb severing or crushing accidents such that experienced by Renee Katz.

Dr. Shaw eventually returned to Los Angeles to head the surgical department at his alma mater UCLA whose ranking rose during his tenure. He was very compassionate and related to people well, just has he did when he was selling real estate. He sought the same personal quality of compassion when interviewing prospective medical students. He has helped numerous people with his talent, ability, innovative thinking, and work ethic. His story is an inspiration to all of us and his success a source of pride.

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

I first met Peter SooHoo about four years ago when I was conducting interviews for the Chinatown Remembered Project. Despite being more than forty years my senior, Peter immediately struck me as someone who was young at heart. Friendly and outgoing, he was always upbeat and full of energy. From the beginning, Peter was open and willing to help out our project in anyway that he could. He and his wife invited me into his home as if we had been longtime friends. Eventually after he agreed to be part of the project, he showed the same openness to our student interns that he had shown to me.

Peter had a great respect for his father and agreed to be part of our oral history project because he felt that it was important that the world had a fuller picture of his dad. Once he joined the project, he shared with us many of his family photos and agreed to sit for interview after interview; never tiring, even when we asked him to repeat or elaborate on stories that he had already told us. I feel honored to have gotten a chance to know him, and I will personally always be grateful for the support that he lent to our project.
