

This film documents the late Professor Lucie Cheng, UCLA faculty member and longtime Director of the UCLA Asian American Studies Center, and also a pioneering scholar of migration, labor and gender. Winner of Taiwan's prestigious 2012 Golden Harvest Award for Best Documentary, Linking Our Lives, portrays her unfettered spirit and remembers her legacy at UCLA. The filmmaker, Diane Ying, describes Cheng as a person who achieved a lot in her life, but hardly ever talked about herself. Many of her friends in Taiwan were unaware that she propelled the field of Asian American studies in a new direction as the longtime director of the Asian American Studies Center at UCLA. Likewise, her friends in the United States did not know that she continued to help disadvantaged groups such as Asian migrant workers and immigrant spouses to make themselves heard in Taiwan.

CHSSC will host Ch'ing Ming (Chinese Memorial Day) Festival at the historic Chinese Memorial Shrine at Evergreen Cemetery. The Shrine stands at the center of what was once a 19th century Chinese cemetery. Built in 1888 by the people of Los Angeles' Old Chinatown, the Shrine is considered the earliest extant Chinese structure in Los Angeles. The site remains culturally and historically significant and has been designated Los Angeles Historic/Cultural Monument No. 486. It is owned and maintained by the Chinese Historical Society of Southern California. Please join us for this culturally rich event.


# Milton Quon

Milton Quon's freelance and design work for restaurants in New Chinatown include his outdoor lantern sign for Grandview Gardens; now a historic landmark in Chinatown's Central Plaza. Milton gained recognition working for companies such as Walt Disney Studios and becoming the first Chinese American art director at national, now global advertising agency BBDO. Quon has also shared his creative talents as an instructor at Los Angeles Trade Tech College and exhibits for the Chinese American Museum and LMAN Gallery.

Former President and Lifetime Member of the Chinese Historical Society of Southern California (CHSSC) as well as chartered member of the Chinese American Museum (CAM). An actor, singer-songwriter, author, and historian who was a founding member of the Ethnic Minorities Committee of the Screen Actors Guild (SAG). As chairman of the Scholarship Committee at Saint Andrews Baptist Church of Los Angeles, Cy Wong was instrumental in helping multiple students receive scholarships to college from 1993 to 2003. He currently supports St. Jude, Feed the Children, and Senior Citizens of Hollywood on an active basis.

# Celebrating 130 Years Castelar Street Elementary School

This will also include an open house after a 1PM meeting in the multipurpose room hosted by the school. The new Music Room will have historic photos that will be available for public viewing.

In 1882, Los Angeles opened a four-room school across from the French Hospital. In 1903, the main building of the little school was destroyed by fire and a 13-room Victorian structure was built in its place. By the 1970s, the Victorian gave way to a new 33-room complex.


Castelar Elementary School is the second oldest continuously operating school in the Los Angeles Unified School District. Through these 130 years, Castelar School has successfully laid the academic foundation for many generations of children. Castelar remains a unique space in Los Angeles' multicultural history.





### THE JADE PENDANT

A novel by L. P. Leung



The Jade Pendant is a romantic and tragic story between Peony, who inherited the heirloom jade pendant from her grandmother, and her husband Tom. Their lives together was short, but their love for each other was intimate and strong. Every year for over fifty years, Tom visited her gravesite alone to "listen" to her. The settings of the story encompass San Francisco and Los Angeles, with connections to southeast China and Hong Kong.

This fictionalized novel is built around a ghastly episode inflicted upon the Los Angeles Chinese community of about 200 residents on October 24, 1871. It was a grim page of history of Los Angeles that it preferred to bypass. East coast journalists labeled the city as the "Blood Stained Eden".

The readers will get a glimpse into the lives of early Chinese immigrants in the late 19th century California as seen from the perspectives of several divergent, interconnected characters. The story is interwoven with interactions between Chinese and Caucasian immigrants.

The central character - Peony - A vibrant, smart and beautiful girl raised in China by her widower father in an untraditional way. Her independent spirit and her determination to control her own destiny took her to America at age 17. Many young girls from China were sold into prostitution in California.

Peony indentured herself for five years as a domestic servant in a brothel in San Francisco where three Chinese men and an Irish journalist were infatuated with her.

The mystic heirloom jade pendant possessed by Peony is the principal prop of the novel. It gave her wisdom to deal with many difficult situations and protected her on the journey from her home village to Hong Kong, and then to San Francisco and Los Angeles.

As one of the rioters in the 1871 Chinatown Massacre, Irish journalist Frank Michaels searched for and pillaged a fortune in gold nuggets and snatched Peony's jade pendant. He kept the jade pendant as his surrogate mistress for 52 years. Facing his own imminent mortality in 1923, he desperately sought some degree of absolution for his participation in the Massacre by returning the jade pendant to Peony's husband.

In deteriorating health, Tom determined to make his final visit to Peony's grave to give her back the jade pendant. Her mystic presence and their subsequent encounter was surreal.
