John Jung is a phenomenon: a career academic turned "outsider" scholar, he has managed to reshape our understanding of the Chinese American experience by his novel historical studies, and through his published works about Chinese immigrants in North America. A Chinese American Odyssey provides readers yet another work to savor. A fascinating book about a journey that started with the author's memoir about growing up in a laundry in Macon, Georgia, where his family were the only Chinese. A Chinese American Odyssey is an account of a vital retirement, of people he met along the way, history of Chinese in North America, the ins and outs of self-publishing, the book talk circuit, and much more. Part memoir, part how-to book, it provides a detailed and engaging study of author Jung's transformation from a psychologist into a historian, as well as lessons for independent researchers.

John Jung will be commentating on his incredible, and unexpected journey, in researching, writing and speaking about his four books on Chinese American history after retiring from a 40 year career as a professor of psychology in 2007.

Fighting for the Dream

Voices of Chinese American Veterans from World War II to Afghanistan

Author Victoria Moy brings together a collection of oral histories from 40 Chinese American men and womenages 24 to 94—who served in wars from World War II to conflicts in Afghanistan. These individuals defied boundaries, went against their cultural grain, and changed history. Through their personal stories, we see a greater tapestry that is the story of America in the last hundred years, from the lens of Chinese Americans who served. We see also how different wars affected the Chinese American community.

This collection includes interviews with the first Asian American general (John Fugh), the first Asian American Assistant Secretary of Defense for Force Management Policy (Frederick Pang), the first Asian American full unrestricted Marine (Kurt Lee), the first Asian American National Commander of the American Legion (Fang Wong), the first Asian American judge in New York State (Randall Eng), as well as some of the 20,000 Chinese Americans — a quarter of the Chinese American population at the time — who served during World War II.

In Memoriam



Dolores Wong 1921-2014

Dolores Wong, lifetime member of the CHSSC and longtime Chinese American Citizens Alliance member, will certainly be missed. Her achievements as a community activist have left a lasting impression on the Chinese American community. Dolores Wong is a fourth generation Chinese American, who grew up in Vallejo, a small town outside of San Francisco. She became the first person in her family to attend college, receiving a bachelor's degree from the University of California, Berkeley in 1942 and a master's in social work from Smith College in 1946. Following graduate school, she worked as a psychiatric social worker in New Orleans, and later at the Sacramento Mental Hygiene Clinic in Sacramento.

She and her husband, the late Judge Delbert Wong, moved to Los Angeles in 1950. In addition to raising four children, her 50 years-plus of volunteer work included her church, PTA, Cub Scouts, the Griffith Park Coordinating Council, Resthaven Hospital, and Asian Americans for Peace. She organized the first Chinatown Democratic Club in her home, and also helped charter the Chinatown Teen Post. She served as a mentor for many years to the staff who were part of the Post.


One of her most significant contributions was helping establish and fundraise for the Friends of the Chinatown Library. Even though many people doubted that the Friends could even raise the initial \$75,000, through Mrs. Wong's efforts, she helped raise well over \$1 million in her over 30-year involvement with the Chinatown Library.

She is survived by sons Kent, Duane and Marshall and daughter Shelley, and several grandchildren. We are grateful for the Wong family, who continue to contribute to and support the CHSSC today.

Robert C. Verre 1945-2014

We would like take this chance to remember and honor Robert Verre, lifetime member and CHSSC regular, who passed away in September. Over the years, Robert has become a familiar face at CHSSC and volunteered much of his time here trying to improve the facilities.
