Author Victoria Moy, who spent seven years interviewing and recording fascinating stories of Chinese American veterans from World War II to Afghanistan, leads a panel discussion reflecting on war, ethnicity, military service, and identity. Joining the discussion are Michael Chan, a filmmaker and USC Cinematic Arts graduate who served two tours of duty in Fallujah, Iraq, in 2006 and 2007, and Janet Chin, who served in South Korea and Haiti and is currently running for Rosemead City Council.


Moy will share highlights from her book, including memories of World War II veteran and CHSSC member Dr. Wing Mar, who landed on the deserted beachhead of Okinawa with a yelping monkey on his shoulder and shared a foxhole with a Navajo Code Talker.

These personal stories of Chinese Americans who served present American history from a unique angle.

Victoria Moy was born and raised in New York's Chinatown and currently lives in Los Angeles, where she is pursuing a MFA in Playwriting/Screenwriting/TV writing at USC. She has written forHuffington Post, Brooklyn Rail, New York Press, and other publications and is a graduate of Dartmouth College.

Chinese American Interracial Marriage in Massachusetts During the Exclusion Era, 1885-1930

In our last meeting, Laura Ng, CHSSC board member and historical archaeologist, shared her research on Chinese American interracial marriage in Massachusetts during the Exclusion Era. Many states during that era had actually banned marriage between Asians and Whites, with the exception of Massachusetts and a few other states (mostly in the Northeast). In her presentation, Laura managed to show records of interracial marriages between Chinese American men and women of non-Asian descent and elaborated on the various circumstances that led to these rare couplings. The following Q&A session sparked an engaging conversation about family lineage and the Asian American identity.

- a) Scholarship Application Form
- b) Copy of all post-high school transcripts.
 Scanned copies are acceptable.
- Personal essay, approximately 600 to 700 words, that discusses your work on Chinese American history or in the Chinese American community
- d) Research paper, approximately 1000 to 3000 words, illustrating your research on Chinese/Asian American Studies. Paper can be original work or previously submitted for a class.
- e) One letter of recommendation from professor or work supervisor
- Finalists MUST be available for interview on Sunday, April 19, 2015, at CHSSC in Los Angeles' Chinatown (travel expenses to be paid by students).


