Giving Thanks

As we enter the holiday season, we make plans to gather with family and friends. We gather to celebrate life, health, the planet, the human mind. In this newsletter, you'll see an announcement of our holiday dinner gathering in Chinatown at the Golden Dragon Restaurant. It's an opportunity to see each other in person, not on a screen, to see, hear, and feel the warmth within our fellow members and friends, accompanied by a festive, freshly cooked, hot banquet meal selected by our dinner team headed by Bob Lee. We'll have a microphone for us to share some of our stories of the past year, and show many photos from our activities.

But before we start December, I want to provide a quick recap of our recent activities. We had program meetings over Zoom on October 5 (Sophia Wong and Calvin Wong on Grandview Gardens Restaurant) and November 2 (David Lei on lion dance traditions), with a combined audience of over 250! In the six weeks prior to this writing, we shared our Chinatown's history and culture through four walking tours, for 28 senior citizens from Ventura, 16 students from Occidental College, 19 8th graders from Desert Christian School in Lancaster, and 40 humanities administrators from across the country. The last tour was accomplished with volunteer help from docents Tim Lee, Pauletta Pierce, Grace Leo, Ricky Leo, Cindy Fong and myself, augmented with commentary by USC professor William Deverell and Chinese American Museum leadership Gay Yuen and Michael Truong. We held our yard sale fundraiser--hearty thanks! to Anna Gee and her crew. Linda Bentz organized the set up for a well-visited table at the Archives Bazaar at USC, assisted by many hands. We've had meetings with the Huntington-USC ICW team and Metro to plan for an exhibition on Old Chinatown at Union Station. Our archival team, Linda and interns, are at CHSSC several times a week, organizing our library and archives. And I, myself, have some outreach presentations in the coming days. But in between all this, we said farewell to friend, colleague, family member, community historian, and past board member Gilbert Hom on October 18th. I, and many others, will miss Gilbert.

So this holiday season, we will remember our successes, and our families and friends, and give thanks.

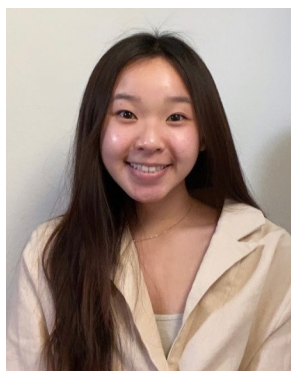

The 2022 CHSSC summer internship was one of the most memorable and eye-opening experiences I've ever had. The opportunity to meet and work with such admirable and inspiring narrators during my rounds of interviews gave me insight into Asian American history in a way that my classes couldn't convey. The internship went beyond what school texts could express. I was able to connect the dots and draw the connections to events that I read about in class and see how real people and families were affected by them.

Besides the extensive training on how to conduct an oral history and clear transcripts, I am so grateful to have been part of a welcoming and supportive network. My intern cohort and the project directors were just as passionate about Ethnic Studies and Asian American stories as I was. These ten weeks have cemented my goals

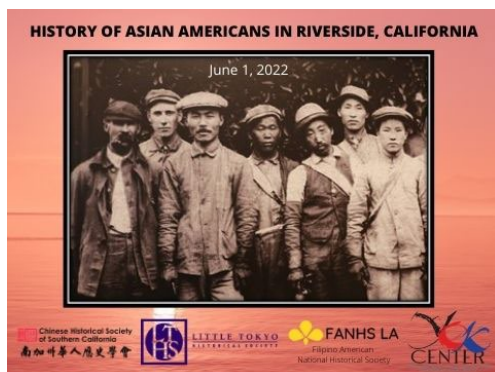

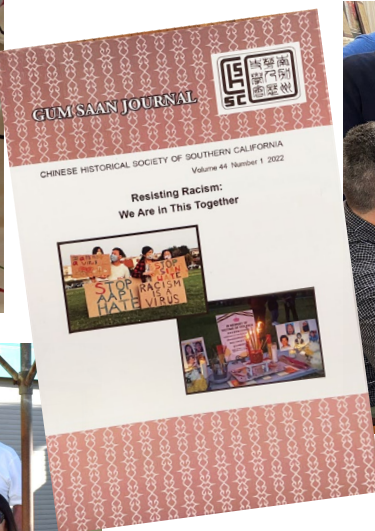

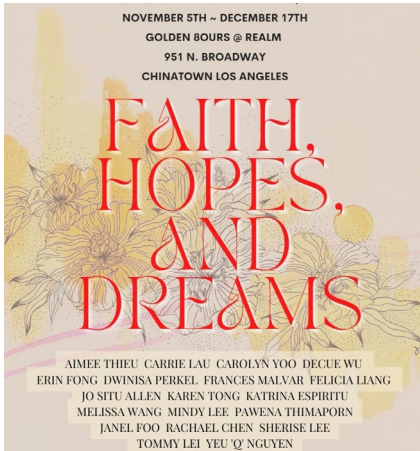
