President's Letter

For the past 4 years of my presidency, I have used the monthly News 'N Notes as an advertisement for our organization. At some point I realized that people don't know what we are doing. The newsletter seemed the logical way to spread that information. The recent newsletters document the grants we have received, the interns, the volunteers, the donors, and our projects. With the many photos that are included, the newsletter has become like a time capsule.

Discovering and recording Chinese American history and making that history known to the world is a process. The progress made during the past 4 years has been made possible by active board members, generous donors, volunteers, and networking with other organizations.

Ten years ago, with the support of the National Park Service, CHSSC organized the first pilgrimage to Yosemite in an effort to make the contributions of the Chinese to the development of Yosemite Nation Park known. The National Parks Conservation Association joined this partnership. Last Fall an exhibit focused on the history of the Chinese in Yosemite was opened in a former Chinese Laundry building in Wawona.

Over 3 years ago members of the Institute of California in the West (ICW) sought our collaboration regarding their Old Chinatown project. Last year a grant they were awarded for this project included money for CHSSC to help fund our participation in their research efforts.

With the help of a major donor, CHSSC has developed a media center. This involved hiring an IT specialist to design and wire the houses for high-speed internet before installing a new high-speed server. This increased the capacity for our online presence.

After an extensive review and analysis of our archives by a company sponsored by the California State Library, CHSSC developed a future plan for preserving our extensive archives and making them available. Part of this process involved hiring a Collections Manager and interns to create exhibits and put finding aids on the Online Archive of California.

Our educational outreach has been noteworthy. First, Linda Bentz worked with UCR students as part of a public history seminar. The final projects that the students created after researching East Adams and City Market are now on our website. Last summer Dr. Will Gow and Dr. Kelly Fong held a summer class for interns that taught the interns about collecting Chinese American history. The class was so successful that we had 53 applicants from throughout the US for this summer's program.

Outreach is critical to fulfilling our mission. Having monthly program meetings online has allowed us to reach people from throughout the U.S. Our program speakers have included experts from outside Los Angeles. A community organization that was founded by people with a shared purpose needs to keep its connections to the local community. In the next year, read our newsletter for opportunities for us to gather as a group.

CHSSC Awarded Grant

CHSSC was awarded a \$5,000 grant from the Cathay Bank Foundation. Cathay Bank, the oldest Chinese American Bank in Southern California, established a foundation in 2002. The foundation awards grants to create opportunities for affordable housing, community and economic development, and education.

CHSSC sought funding to make the Southern California Oral History Project (SCOHP) available to the public. This project which was done in partnership with UCLA Asian American Studies Center that began more than 40 years ago, resulted in oral interviews of 169 early Chinatown pioneers. These recently digitized interviews will be uploaded to our website, with capacity enhancements supported by the grant.

The Five Chinatowns Project Needs Your Support

Do you have memories of the Chinese American community in Los Angeles during the period before 1965? Did you live, work or play in China City, New Chinatown, Old Chinatown, City Market or the Adams and San Pedro neighborhood during this period? If so, then the society needs you! We are currently searching for volunteers to share their memories in oral history interviews with our society interns this summer. We are recruiting community members who agree to be paired with a high school or college intern and sit for two interviews focused on personal memories of the Chinese American community in Los Angle before 1965. Interviews can take place in person or on Zoom this summer in July and August.

With the support of generous donors at the CHSSC, we have recruited a talented group of summer interns from across the US and Canada. These interns will be with us for a ten-week paid summer program in which we teach the basics of oral history methodology and provide background on Los Angeles Chinese American history. Led by Dr. William Gow of Sacramento State University, Dr. Isabella Quintana of UC Irvine and Dr. Kelly Fong of UCLA, our interns will receive training and lessons from top scholars in the field of Asian American studies.

But we are short volunteers who are willing to be interviewed. We need at least five more people with memories of Los Angeles in the period before 1965 who are willing to participate. All interviews will be recorded and archived with the CHSSC. Excerpts of the interviews will be included in the society's next book project focused on the history of the five Chinatowns of Los Angeles.
