President's Letter

From the beginning of the organization, CHSSC was formed with a multi-faceted vision. Researching the history of the Chinese in Southern California involved collecting artifacts of these pioneers; collecting their stories; recording this information and making it known through publications, walking tours, and participation in public events.

The February program speakers, Yenyen Chan and Jack Shu, explained how our vision of making the contributions of the Chinese known became an exhibit in a former Chinese laundry in Yosemite. What began as a yearly pilgrimage to Yosemite ten years ago expanded to attract many who want to learn about this unknown part of history. Networking with the National Park Service and the National Parks Conservation Association led to greater visibility. Articles appeared in the Southwest Airlines monthly magazine and AAA's Westways magazine. The photos of CHSSC members in the exhibit and our listing on the exhibit panels, in a national park enhances our public profile.

As our outreach grows through our online presence, CHSSC has become a research destination. CHSSC has a comprehensive library for scholars. Last fall CHSSC received over 30 cartons of books from Paul Chace and the John Jung families. Previously, all the titles of our book collection were accessible online on Libib. Currently, we are working to add the new books to this list.

With the help of a generous donation a couple of years ago, CHSSC began our quest to develop a media center in order to put our extensive archives online. CHSSC acquired a powerful server in order to house all of the new information. Our interns have been digitizing our archives and creating exhibits to put on Libib and Omeka. Scholars everywhere can become aware of what we have. This month a PhD student from Chicago came to see the archives and our library.

Our new, upgraded website is another link to the outside. Not only can people learn about the history of our organization, but also people can learn about Chinese American history. The website has online exhibits made by interns as well as one paid for by a Louie Foundation grant. Recordings of monthly meetings since the Fall of 2020 are now available on our website. Forty-five years of Gum Saan Journals are now available online for the public.

Over the past three years we have been working with technology specialists, interns and our Collections Manager to organize and share our digital assets with the public. These assets include photographs, audio files from past oral history projects, videos and so much more! Now you can see and hear Chinese residents tell their stories from the comfort of your own home. Uploading digitized materials to the Archives is an ongoing process and additional content will be added frequently.

The Digital Archives can be viewed on our new CHSSC website designed by our Vice President Ricky Leo. The website contains a variety of information including an illustrated history of the Society, our participation with the Los Angeles Chinatown over the years, our publications, an events calendar and videos of past monthly meetings. We have also included online exhibits such as Chinatown Remembered. 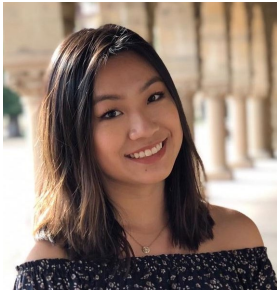
