President's message

I would like to introduce myself as the incoming president of the Chinese Historical Society of Southern California. After serving as the Vice President for the past two years, I feel that I am ready to take on this important leadership role. I have learned a great deal about this wonderful organization, the dedicated people behind it, and the purposes of the Society that you can read in the mission statement included in every issue of our newsletter.

Here is some background on how I became involved with the Society. My wife Grace and I have been members for many years, mainly from knowing Linda Bentz, who serves on the board and is also involved with the Ventura County Chinese Historical Society. When the Congressional Gold Medal was awarded to Chinese American WWII veterans, we registered my father and Grace helped families in Ventura County to register their veterans. We were invited to serve on the committee in Los Angeles to deliver the medal to the living veterans in Southern California, including the only living veteran in Ventura County. It was such a rewarding experience to meet with these veterans and listen to their stories. Because of this, we were invited to join the board and we accepted.

There are many important issues facing the Society that we need to address in the upcoming year. We have a vast archive of artifacts that we have started to digitize so that they can be readily accessed. A great deal of progress has been made, but much more work needs to be done. A number of years ago, we committed to renovating our Heritage Center in Los Angeles Chinatown. We are close to getting the necessary building permits, but we will need to raise additional funds to make this a reality. We have received many requests from researchers looking for materials in our archives, but we have a limited number of interns and volunteers to fulfill them.

As with other non-profit organizations, we rely on grants and donations to conduct our business. We have much to offer: monthly programs featuring interesting topics and knowledgeable speakers; an updated website where you can access our digital archives, on-line exhibits, collections, publications and other resources; events like our summer picnic and holiday get together, and so much more. 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Reflections

Through the UCLA Community Archives Lab / Andrew W. Mellon Foundation Internship Program I was given the opportunity to intern at CHSSC during my 2022/2023 school year. This experience has given me the chance to explore the different types of archival work like digitizing, cataloging, archive maintenance, processing collections, and many other aspects. The different projects I have taken on here have enabled me to grow my skills and interests in archives greatly, specifically within the areas of cataloging and preservation. Starting off my internship last year, I worked with inventorying "grey literature" from the Paul Chace Collection, allowing me to explore the types of resources CHSSC has available for researchers. Continuing my library work, I assisted in organizing and updating CHSSC's Libib as well as organizing the physical library.

The project that I have been working on throughout my internship is the Southern California Oral History Project, which includes nearly 1,700 photos. This work has included digitizing photos and cataloging them by conducting research through looking through the oral histories left by the collection donors. The work in cataloging the photos piqued my interests, I did not have experience in cataloging and the process of learning it and applying that to the photos was very interesting to me. Because of this project I sought out cataloging courses within my program as I became more interested in this area of study through my experience at CHSSC. I also had a chance to work on creating a finding aid for a collection. I was able to work more extensively on ArchivesSpace than I had before in my classes and complete the full process of getting the finding aid I created on the Online Archive of California.

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Five Chinatowns Project: Share Your Stories with the CHSSC

The Five Chinatowns community history project is entering our final summer of research. We are hosting a group of high school and college student volunteers who are researching census manuscripts for the East Adams neighborhood. Our research manager Yi-Shen Loo is developing the project website. Our leadership team is providing final comments on essays about New Chinatown during the Cold War, CFO Service Station, and the origins of the City Market.

Even with all we have done, we are still seeking untold stories of these communities. This is your final chance to contribute your memories, family photos, or memorabilia to the project. We are collecting all stories related to the Five Chinatowns of Los Angeles before 1965. We are especially interested in stories related to East Adams, the Chinese Presbyterian Church, the Drum & Bugle Corps, and any and all aspects of China City. This is your chance to have your family's history included in our Five Chinatowns book and saved in our CHSSC archive. We are conducting oral histories, scanning family photos, and collecting written reflections until September of 2023. After that, we will be concluding the research phase of our project and will be turning our attention to finalizing writing and editing our book. 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Sign Up for 2023 Yosemite Pilgrimage - October 6-7

We are continuing our planning for our annual excursion to Yosemite, which this year has been pushed to the fall to avoid the summer heat. There will be two full days of activities within Yosemite on Fri-Sat Oct. 6-7, including driving to and hikes along historic trails/roads, touring-walking in Yosemite Valley and enjoying scenic vistas and waterfalls, visiting the Chinese Laundry exhibit, and enjoying fellowship at a potluck dinner on Saturday evening. We will also hear a special presentation by guest speaker Phil Sexton, a State Parks cultural resources consultant who has been working on historic protection for the Summit (railroad) Tunnels, built in the Sierras by Chinese workers in the 1860's.

Transportation is via your own vehicles, but we can help plan carpools. Also, we're planning some driving stops to and from Yosemite, which may include: the Sugar Pine Railroad and Fresno Flats (Chinese work camps), Chinatowns in Fresno, Hanford, Bakersfield, and the new Lang Station-San Fernando Tunnel historic site markers.

A limited number of bedrooms are available in large cabins already reserved for three nights (arrive evening of Thu. Oct. 5) at the Redwoods in Yosemite complex, or you may reserve your own cabin. <u>https://redwoodsinyosemite.com/</u>. 
